Through Chernobilsky's lens, we witness not only the deep pain of women displaced since the outbreak of war on October 7th, but also their enduring spirit as they are forced to leave behind their homes, communities, and the lives they once knew. These images offer a visual testament of *Ruach Chaim* and the resilience, strength, and dignity these women encompass in the face of unimaginable adversity.

Chernobilsky's work reminds us that the challenges faced by these women, are part of a larger narrative of resilience and hope. His photographs not only tell the story of displacement but also challenge us to recognize the strength found in vulnerability, the power of community, and the healing that can emerge from shared humanity.
